Process vs Outcome. There were some new learnings throughout the session along with some strong affirmations for staff. As a collective, we are working really hard every day to build a culture of fairness and an environment where mistakes are seen as opportunities to grow. Of course, we understand that outcomes are important, however, it is consistency in a fair and transparent process that will ultimately build trust and strengthen relationships within our school community that is most significant.

NAIDOC Celebrations

Last Friday, we celebrated NAIDOC day. This year's theme is – The Next Generation: Strength, Vision and Legacy. It was a wonderful occasion where we recognized and honoured the history, culture, and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and learnt about the rich heritage of the First Nations people. Throughout the day, students and staff engaged in a variety of activities including storytelling, indigenous games, artifacts, johnny cakes and boomerang throwing. We were fortunate to have the support of local KESO's (Koorie Education Support Officers) and MASP employees to assist on the day, which concluded with a smoking ceremony facilitated by Uncle Peter. I would like to extend a big 'thank you' to Ms. Anderson, Mrs. Mumford and Miss. Claire for their thorough planning and excellent organisation in bringing our community together for such an important celebration.







Book Week


